

The imperative to train the laity

Editorial



The Protestant Reformation of the 16th. century recovered the place of the laity - believing women and men in the local church. Luther and other reformers rescued what we know as the "universal priesthood" of believers. The laity in the Catholic Church were mere acolytes - assistants of the priest. The authority, teaching, and mission were in the hands of the clerical leadership. They were the scholars, teachers and the caretakers of the being and workings of the church - the mass, liturgy and ministries. The laity were the common people, who were considered uneducated and ignorant of the Bible, church affairs and mission. This perspective only change in the mid-20th. century at the second Vatican Council.

Since the Reformation the laity - the people of God - regained its role according to the New Testament. The flawed process of the medieval church was reversed.

Since that time lay people have played an important role in spreading the gospel.

However, today we still struggle with some vestiges of clerical catholicism. Most biblical theological entities for example focus their major efforts on the theological education of pastors and missionaries. Without a doubt, it has been fundamental for the edification of the church the pastoral work and the missions. However, the same attention has not been given to the biblical formation of the laity. This deficit of formation has repercussions on the poor projection of the laity, and consequently of the church. Their incidence has been limited in terms of social impact in their communities and thus in the country.

Lay people need to be formed from the perspective of integral mission. Mainly, because most of them believe that their mission is to evangelize their peers and to keep their testimony. Advocacy for justice, care of the environment, or fighting for the workers' rights is not part of their mission agenda. In general, they not only fail to take up these challenges, but also allow themselves to be influenced by the system. For example, success is sought according to the success criteria of the market society, and not according to the values of the kingdom of God. Partly, because of the training they have received, they are trained in spiritual, family or ecclesial life, but not necessarily to face the challenges the world of work academy, the arts, politics or business.

It is therefore imperative that the laity have a biblical formation that provides theological criteria for discerning their world, so that they can be agents of changes in the name of Christ, and contribute to the spiritual and social development of their community and society. Mark Greene from his context proposes that young believers study for one or two years at a bible college before going to university or starting a job. He argues that is education is need even more for work in a secular organization that for work in the church. Precisely because people's views in this context may be opposed to Christianity, and because they will be challenged to work on a variety of issues and problems that require much discernment. He emphasizes that since christians spend most of their lives at work, they should be trained biblically and see their work as a mission field.[1]

In the Old Testament we find men and women that maintained their faith in God, and at the same time advocated for the common good in non-christian societies. For example, the midwives who fought for a medical ethic in defiance of Pharaoh's orders to kill the male babies of the Jews; the young servant of King Naaman who dared to suggest that he go to Israel to be healed; and what about Joseph, who in Egypt became second in command and saved the country and his family from a terrible famine and danger of death. Greene claims that these were not spiritual giants, but ordinary women and men taking up their faith in their workplaces.[2]

In the New Testament the leadership opened the way for mission, established churches and trained the laity, but it was the laity who carried the gospel throughout the empire. They embraced Christian deaconship, apologetics, teaching, pastoral care and evangelism as a way of life. The Thessalonians make this evident. They imitated Paul and fellow ministers and the Lord, they were an example to all in Macedonia and Achaia who believed, and they spread the gospel not only in Macedonia and Achaia, but also everywhere their faith in God spread, so that the apostles no longer needed to speak (1 Ts.1:6-8). In Peter's words, the mission of proclaiming the virtues of God - not just the message of salvation - rests on the shoulders of the church (the "laos" of God, 1 Pet.2:9 KJV).

In today's context of society the laity are equally challenged: to bear witness to their faith in word and deed, and to be proactive for the common good in their fields of work. In this case, it is necessary that their pastors train them in these issues, and at the same time, encourage them to seek a formation that helps them to connect the Bible with the social reality, and provides them with criteria to know how to face the challenges of their environment. In celebration of the Protestant Reformation, let us affirm the universal priesthood of believers, and the imperative to form the laity in the Word from mission in the manner of Jesus. The Ezra Centre, aware of this need, offers various diploma courses that, from a biblical worldview, connect the challenges of work, the environment, children and adolescents, integral health, citizen participation and mission in their context, so that the laity can be agents of change in the name of Christ. To the extent that they are salt and light of the world, the church will be able to project a mission that will have a greater impact on society, so that when they see their good works, they will glorify the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

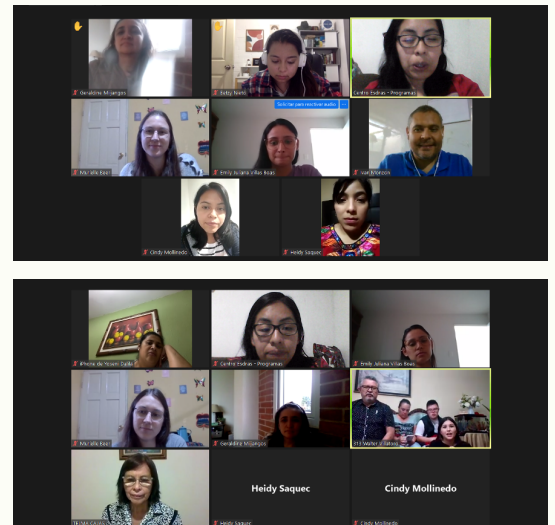

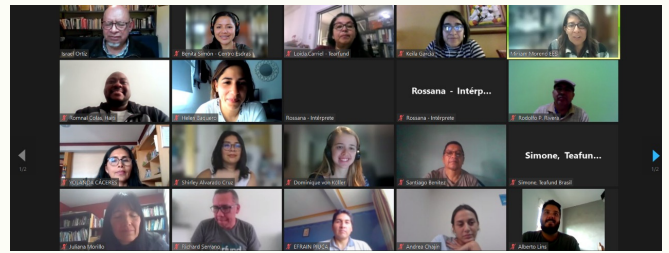

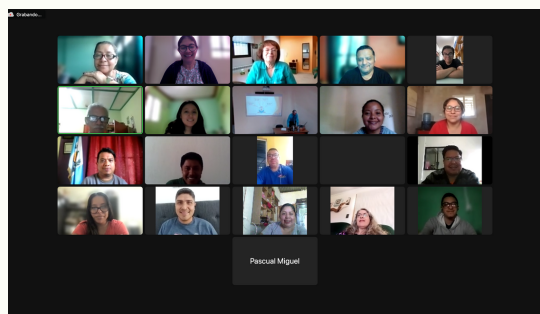


Campaign #AcciónPorLaCreación (ActionForCreation)

We are very excited about the opportunity to welcome 23 students to the "Integral Care of the Church Leader" course that is being taught in hybrid format at the Central American Theological Seminary. Students who are joining online come from countries such as Peru, Mexico, El Salvador and the United States. A pastor who received integral health coaching once commented: "I suggest that the topic of integral health be part of the seminary curriculum." Rather than trying to make changes too late in ministry, it is good to get off to a good start. This same pastor commented on how some of his fellow pastors were in poor health and this was affecting their ability to exercise their leadership. Just as he was able to implement good habits, he saw that it is possible to take action to prevent disease.

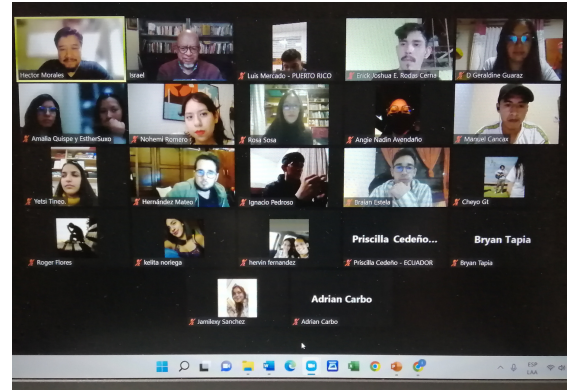


Also by surprise, the Lord has opened a door to give workshops on "The Biblical Perspective on Prevention" in conjunction with the Panamerican Health Organization with religious leaders in Coban. These workshops are being planned for mid-November.

Contributing to key leadership training

Earlier this year we received an invitation from Hector Morales, director of Youth for Christ Latin America, to participate in the design and facilitation of the "Follower of Jesus" module as part of a training proposal for high potential leaders of the organization.
